An Ambitious Young Rabbi Discovered a Need and Set Out to Fill it

Rabbi Shaya Winiarz shares the story behind our newest pamphlet, Laws that Apply from the Moment of Passing.



Rabbi Winiarz, please share a little bit about vourself.

I grew up in Staten Island, NY. I'm a second-generation talmid of Yeshivas Chofetz Chaim and received semichah from there as well. Presently, I'm the Rav of Congregation Beis Hillel in Elizabeth, NJ.



The halachos in Laws that Apply from the Moment of Passing are fundamental, but not commonly known. What motivated you to explore

this topic?

When I was training to become a rav, I spoke to many rabbanim about which

areas of halachah to focus on most. While not everyone gave me the same answers, the first item on every rav's list was the same: hilchos aveilus. I was told that every type of rav in every community will be faced with circumstances that require knowledge of these halachos. The situations in which aveilusrelated questions come up are

usually time-sensitive and the people involved are highly emotional. If a rav

is not confident and comfortable with the halachos, he won't be able to do his job well.

So I decided to spend several months learning hilchos aveilus in depth. While there are various areas of hilchos aveilus, I realized that there is a significant body of *halachah* that applies around the time of death - immediately before, during and after the *petirah*.



But if someone knows which sefarim to use, can't he just check the halachos himself?

I found that there is no place in which all the *halachos* are delineated in the correct order. Even someone who knows where to look and how to learn would have to

> collect the relevant halachos from different places. These include *halachos* that apply to the one who passes and to those who are present when it happens. There are halachos about what to do and say and what not to do. There is so much one has to know on the spot.

Halachah is not meant to

be overwhelming; rather *halachah*, from the *shoresh* of *holeich* – *to* go – is our guide for how we should "go" about our lives. Having spent the time immersed in this topic, I wanted to make a pamphlet that would clearly delineate what I had learned for the benefit of others –

rabbanim, chaplains and laypeople.

This project dovetails nicely with some of Chevrah Lomdei Mishnah's other publications. How did you come to collaborate with them?

When I was part of NCYI's rabbinic training program, Rabbi Moshe Haikins shared the *Final Prayers* and *Aninus* pamphlets with us. I had also heard about some of their projects from my father,

Rabbi Dovid Winiarz, *zt"l.* When I approached Rabbi Haikins about typesetting my material to make it usable for the public, he offered to produce it as a Chevrah Lomdei Mishnah pamphlet.

The end result exceeded my expectations. Besides

the pamphlet's user-friendly, beautiful presentation, another bonus of working with Rabbi Haikins was that he had all the material looked over and approved by Rabbi Yaakov Forchheimer, a well-known *posek*, which means it will hopefully be accepted by the broader public.

Can you share any feedback you've gotten since compiling the *halachos*?

I actually personally benefited from what I compiled. I brought the printout of this material to the hospital

shortly before my mother's *petirah* to give to my sister, who would be on call there for the next shift. I told her, "I hope you won't need this, but I want you to have it should the need arise."

Her response was something I think everyone should hear: "We are Torah Jews, and we want to live every single moment of life *al pi halachah.*"

That was a *kiddush Hashem*. Even though like most people, she didn't want to think about it – she didn't want to need it – she *did* want to have the information necessary to do Hashem's will.

Is there anything in particular that you think people should be aware of?

I've found that people have a visceral fear of learning the *halachos* related to death and even of taking these pamphlets – almost as if there's a club of people who die – and they are not members of that club!


As my sister said, the point is that we want to be able to do the right thing. And that's what making these pamphlets available is all about.
